
#### Student(s) and/or groups in focus this month:



## Student(s) and/or groups in focus this month:




## Student(s) and/or groups in focus this month:





# SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT REPORT BOARD OF EDUCATION

## 11/15/2022

Glen Bloemker - Director of Technology

Technology regular updates – The Technology department has started this school year quite busy. From August 1st through November 7th, we have closed over 1040 tickets which is the same as last year during the same period. As of this writing, we have 36 open issues ranging from a few SPecial Education iPad issues, chromebooks repairs (2/36), a few printing issues, a few projector issues and a few project requests.

With the school year in full swing, we strive daily to keep the district fully operational. We are looking at projects and upgrades to keep the district operating at full capacity. Projects currently underway are the UPS replacement project and the HVAC mechanical server upgrade project. Projects being considered are a replacement firewall, possible replacement phone system options and security systems vetting to ensure the district is getting the best deal.

Chromebook Repairs and Support – Currently, there are 2 chromebooks being repaired. Replacement parts are being ordered as needed when supplies run low. We were able to reclaim chromebook parts from devices that have died.

Application Updates – ISBE continues to be updated on a weekly basis. Any issues contained in the results are corrected as soon as possible. Fall enrollment verification process is due for completion by November 11th. We are mostly complete however, the ISBE website where the data for verification is located remains under construction. I am seeking guidance from ISBE on how to complete the process.

Tyler SIS K-12 replacement vendor search has concluded. The district's new SIS vendor will be School Insight (SI). We had the project kick-off meeting on November 4th. The SQL data file from Tyler has been made accessible to SI so they are able to begin gleaning data from it to import into the new system. ISBE data files have been obtained and put into the SI file repository.

SOPPA compliance is an ongoing process for the district. I continue to process the requests as they come in through the ticket system.

ERATE: The replacement UPS unit for the server room at the High School has been ordered through CDWG. A few of the parts have been received already. The remaining pieces are scheduled to arrive November 29th. We have a tentative installation date of January 3rd which might go into the 4th for final activation. So I am hoping they will be able to complete the swap out of the old unit and the installation of the new one in one day. There has been no update on the filing for the use of ECF funds to purchase replacement chromebooks for the 2024 school year. This has not been approved yet by USAC and it might not get approved as more requests were filed than monies are available. I keep hoping!

Other items – We are also doing our best in the technology arena to keep the district running as smoothly as possible.

## SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT REPORT BOARD OF EDUCATION 11/15/22

## Director of Special Education, Crystal Swan-Gravatt

This past month was the IAASE Fall Conference held in Tinley Park. This was the first "in person" conference this director has attended since February 2020. The sessions that were a primary focus and this Director attended included the following:

- Legal Issues in Special Education
- Restraint and Time Out rules/regs
- Managing Student Safety From Threat Assessments to Clear and Present Danger
- Evidence-Based Funding and Special Education The Basics of Funding and Planning
   for EBF Dollars
- How to Discuss Difficult and Disturbing Behaviors with Parents
   ED's Guidance on the Discipline of Students with Disabilities.
- Self-Care for Special Education Administrators

It is easy to see that BEHAVIOR was a focus this school year at the conference given that most of the sessions centered on discussions and best practices to address negative student behavior.

Furthermore, the conference is always a great time to connect with other Directors of Special Education throughout the state. There is much support available for all participants when you are able to converse with your peers about similar issues and problems going on in each administrator's perspective districts. The common theme to every conversation this Director had with peers at the conference and during round table discussions, centered upon how the job of special education administration has become even more significantly difficult over the past three years. Stories of severe problem student behavior, significant increased referrals for special

education evaluations, and staff shortages with no answers to fix the problem from state leaders, to finally, stories regarding the increased physical health and mental health needs of students dominated round table discussions. All agreed that these aforementioned issues have increased the workload and roles of Directors across the state so much that some of this Director's peers are looking at early retirement or considering leaving the field of special education administration altogether. Furthermore, IAASE leaders reported to IAASE members during the board meeting that less and less individuals are seeking State Approved Director of Special Education university programs and the pool of candidates for special education administrative positions is less and less each year. They reported that without major intervention, not only will there be a continued shortage of special education teachers, speech and language pathologists, school psychologists, and paraprofessionals; there will also be a shortage of special education administrators across the state in the very near future.
